Palm Sunday/ Sunday of the Passion March 24, 2024

"How Do You View Jesus?" (1 Corinthians 1:18-25)

"Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion!

- Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem!
 - o Behold, your king is coming to you;
 - righteous and having salvation is He,
 - humble and mounted on a donkey,
 - o on a colt, the foal of a donkey."
- "On the foal of a donkey":
 - o I thought about that phrase,
 - and then I thought about the fact that this is a foolish idea.

But this is Palm Sunday,

- the Sunday of the Passion,
 - o and so I do want to talk to you today about "fools."
 - With April Fool's Day coming up a week from tomorrow
 - My question is,
 - o "Who Are the April Fools following
 - the day after Easter?"

- Are we?
 - o Are we fools for believing in,
 - worshiping,
 - and setting our hopes on,
 - o a man who rides into Jerusalem as a king
 - but ends up dying on a cross?
- There are lots of folks who would say we are.
 - o They think we are absolute fools
 - for falling for this old story
 - about some crucified would-be king.
- So it comes back to the question,
 - o "How Do You View Jesus?"

Many say, if you believe in a crucified king,

• you must be fools.

- o But then, this is nothing new.
 - St. Paul got the same reaction
 - as he went about preaching Christ crucified.
- Listen to what he says in 1 Corinthians 1:18-25:
 - o "For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing,
 - but to us who are being saved
 - it is the power of God.
- For it is written,
 - o 'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,
 - and the discernment of the discerning
 - I will thwart.'
 - Where is the one who is wise?
 - Where is the scribe?
 - Where is the debater of this age?
 - Has not God made foolish
 - the wisdom of the world?
 - o For since, in the wisdom of God,
 - *the world did not know God through wisdom,*
 - it pleased God through the folly
 - o of what we preach
 - to save those who believe.

- o For Jews demand signs
 - and Greeks seek wisdom,
 - but we preach Christ crucified,
 - o a stumbling block to Jews
 - and folly to Gentiles,
 - but to those who are called,
 - o both Jews and Greeks,
 - Christ the power of God
 - and the wisdom of God.
- o For the foolishness of God is wiser than men,
 - and the weakness of God
 - is stronger than men."

The word of the cross is foolishness to the people of this world.

- They think we Christians are the biggest fools around
 - o for making such a big deal
 - about this man Jesus dying on the cross
 - which we do all the time
 - o but never more heavily than we do this week,

- what with the reading of the Passion account
 - Good Friday service.
- Why such an emphasis on Jesus' suffering and death?
 - o Are not you being a bit morbid?
 - So they think.

Last year, around this time,

- there was a knock at the door,
 - o and I answered it,
 - and a man and woman were there,
 - handing me a tract
 - o and inviting me to a special event coming up.
- On the front of this tract you could see the questions:
 - o "How Do You View Jesus?
 - As a Newborn Baby?
 - A Dying Man?
 - o Or an Exalted King?"
- And there are pictures there to go with it:
 - o Jesus as a baby,
 - Jesus as He is dying,
 - and Jesus as a king.
- Then below the pictures was the invitation:
 - o "You Are Invited to Hear the Answer Thursday, April 6, 2023."
 - Then I opened up the tract, and it says:
 - "Jesus is now reigning as an exalted King.
 - o But what does this mean for you?
- Many believe that Jesus died for them.
 - o Yet, how can one man's death almost 2,000 years ago
 - mean life for others today?"
 - The people at my door,
 - o as you may have guessed,
 - were Jehovah's Witnesses,
 - and the tract they gave me
 - \circ was from their Watchtower Society.
- So how do we respond to their questions?
 - o I am going to ask you to think it through
 - along with me.

- As a Newborn Baby?
 - o A Dying Man?
 - Or an Exalted King?"
- My first reaction is,
 - o "What, is this a multiple-choice question?
 - I only get to pick one?"
 - Because my answer would be,
 - o "D. All of the above."
 - "Newborn Baby," check.
 - "Dying Man," check.
 - o "Exalted King," check.

- They are all true.
 - o And you cannot have one without the other.
 - You have got to have all of them right,
 - and not pit one against the other,
 - o in order to have the Jesus of the Bible,
 - the only Saviour of sinners.

The Jehovah's Witnesses do not get any of these views of Jesus right,

- and they do not keep them together.
 - o The implication of their tract
 - is that you should not get hung up on Jesus
 - as a newborn baby,
 - o like at Christmas,
 - or on Jesus as a dying man,
 - like during this Holy Week,
 - o but instead you should focus on Jesus
 - as the exalted king.

Now, is Jesus the exalted king?

- Yes, He is! No doubt about that.
 - o And even the picture of Jesus
 - they have on their tract
 - does have some truth behind it.
 - If you could see it in color,
 - You would see a Jesus with white hair
 - and fiery eyes,
 - o wearing a white robe with a golden sash.
- And that image does resemble the description

- o of our exalted Lord that John gives us in Revelation 1, as follows:
 - "I turned to see the voice that was speaking to me,
 - and on turning I saw seven golden lampstands,
 - o and in the midst of the lampstands one like a Son of Man,
 - clothed with a long robe
 - and with a golden sash
 - o around His chest.
- o The hairs of His head were white,
 - like white wool, like snow.
 - His eyes were like a flame of fire,
 - o His feet were like burnished bronze,
 - refined in a furnace,
 - and His voice was like
 - o the roar of many waters.
- o In his right hand He held seven stars,
 - from His mouth came a sharp two-edged sword,
 - and His face was like the sun
 - o shining in full strength."

Jesus as a glorious, exalted king.

- And so He is.
 - o But the Jehovah's Witnesses conveniently leave out other images of Jesus
 - that we find in the Book of Revelation,
 - especially that of Jesus as "the Lamb who was slain,"
 - $\circ\$ who by His blood has redeemed us sinners.
 - That part they leave out.
 - But again, you cannot have one
 - o without the other.

No, you've got to keep all of these views together to have the real Jesus.

- Even the "newborn baby" the JW's get wrong.
 - \circ They do not believe that the Christ of Christmas
 - is the incarnate Son of God,
 - God in the flesh.
- The Jehovah's Witnesses would not be able to confess
 - o what you just confessed in the Nicene Creed,
 - namely,
 - that the Lord Jesus Christ is
 - o "the only-begotten Son of God,

- begotten of His Father before all worlds,
 - God of God,
 - o Light of Light,
 - very God of very God,
 - o begotten, not made,
 - being of one substance with the Father,
- by whom all things were made."
- The JW's have revived the old Arian heresy
 - o from the fourth century,
 - that Jesus is just a created being
 - at most "a" god, small "g,"
 - o but not true God in His nature.

But most certainly He is.

- And there is no salvation,
 - o for you or for anyone else,
 - without Jesus being precisely that,
 - that is,
 - o the Son of God incarnate.
- Only God in the flesh could rescue us from our predicament,
 - o from the sin and death
 - in which we were trapped.

But people do not want to believe that,

- that our situation was so bad
 - o that I am so bad of a sinner
 - that I cannot save myself by my own efforts,
 - that it took the death of the very Son of God
 - o to save me and to give me life.
 - This is insulting to our pride.
- We think we are good enough on our own,
 - o that if we try hard enough and are good enough,
 - we can work our way into heaven.
 - That is what the Jehovah's Witnesses believe,
 - o and that is what they try to do.
- From God's perspective, this kind of thinking represents the real fools,
 - o because they are rejecting the one and only Saviour
 - that God has sent.

It is not just the JW's, though, who think they don't need a crucified Saviour.

- This proud instinct comes naturally to us all.
 - o It is part of our sinful nature,
 - part of our blindness and arrogance,
 - to think I do not need Jesus,
 - o God's Son,
 - dying on a cross to save me.
- It is the reason people do not come to church.
 - o It is because they think they do not need Jesus that much.
 - They do not need what Christ has to offer them here,
 - they do not need His life-giving Word,
 - o they do not need His ongoing forgiveness,
 - they do not need to be a part of Christ's family,
 - the church.
 - o But that too is foolish thinking.

But now do not stop with the Jehovah's Witnesses

- and the people who do not come to church.
 - o What about us?
 - How tightly are you and I clinging to Christ and His cross?
 - Not that much?
 - o Then we are the fools.
 - I have been given reason
 - to think a lot about this of later.

- ?In our daily lives,
 - o in the way we act and speak and think,
 - is the word of the Lord
 - always making the big difference
 - o in our decisions?
- Are we recognizing our sins
 - o and our need for forgiveness
 - and our need for God's help in holy living?
 - If not, we are diminishing what Christ did for us
 - on the cross,
 - and that is real folly.

As you realize more keenly the ways in which you have diminished

- and downplayed the role of Christ in your life,
 - o as you honestly feel that sinfulness in your soul,
 - now come to Christ your Saviour

- and receive His full and freeing forgiveness.
- Be refreshed by His grace,
 - o which cleanses you like a spring rain
 - and causes the new life within you to flower and grow.
 - God is good,
 - o God is gracious,
 - and He forgives you today for Christ's sake
 - `and renews your spirit.

"How can one man's death almost 2,000 years ago mean life for others today?"

- It may seem like foolishness to the Jehovah's Witnesses,
 - o and foolishness to the world,
 - but to us who are being saved
 - the word of the cross
 - o is the power of God.
- "How can one man's death almost 2,000 years ago
 - o mean life for others today?"
 - It can, and does,
 - when that man is Jesus Christ,
 - o the holy Son of God.

Dear friends,

- these three things all go together,
 - o and thank God they do:
 - Newborn Baby,
 - Dying Man,
 - o Exalted King.
- The newborn baby of Christmas
 - o is Jesus Christ,
 - the eternal Son of God
 - come in the flesh to live and die
 - o as the Saviour of the world.
- This same Jesus went to the cross,
 - o the dying man who died in the place of all sinners
 - who died in your place,
 - shedding His holy blood
 - o to redeem you from sin, Satan, death, and hell,
 - so that now you can look forward in sure hope
 - to "the resurrection of the dead

o and the life of the world to come."

"How do you view Jesus?"

- View Him this week especially as the Dying Man,
 - o suffering and dying on the cross
 - for the sins of the world.
- · Never be ashamed of viewing Him as such,
 - o for there is salvation in no other.
 - Yes, He is risen from the dead,
 - as we will celebrate next Sunday.
- And now this same Jesus
 - o is ruling all things as the Exalted King,
 - and we who trust in Him will live forever in His kingdom.
- But "God has highly exalted him"
 - o precisely because
 - "he humbled Himself
 - by becoming obedient to the point of death,
 - o even death on a cross."

"How do you view Jesus?"

- In faith, and with great joy!
 - o Newborn Baby,
 - Dying Man,
 - Exalted King:
 - o one Lord Jesus Christ,
 - the Saviour of us all.
